Masaryk Memorial Institute's Scholarship and our new winner

Masaryk Memorial Institute (MMI) provides Scholarships to residents of Ontario that are admitted as first-year students to study at post-secondary school institutions (University or College). The intent is to provide scholarships to those students who have Czech or Slovak ancestry and who can demonstrate a commitment or involvement in their culture.

Eligibility

The applicant must achieve an 80% grade average or higher in their final year of secondary school to be eligible and should be able to demonstrate Czech or Slovak "ancestry". Criteria to be attained in order to be considered to receive the Scholarship should include one or more of the following:

- a) has completed two or more years of Czech or Slovak language school during the past ten years;
- b) is able to converse in either Czech or Slovak languages;
- c) is a member or has parents that have been members of Masaryk Memorial Institute during the past ten years;
- d) is a member or has parents that have been members of Sokol organization during the past ten years; or
- e) alternative criteria such as participation in dance, theatre, and church events that demonstrate involvement in the Czech or Slovak community will be considered.
